DAWN's strategic interventions

- Preamble, Sen and Grown
- ▶ UN Decade for Women was based on wrong assumption. In contrast, DAWN questioned the nature of development process itself (pp. 15–16)
- Chapter 1, Taylor
- (15 years later), DAWN questioned how women's rights and development fared in a changed geo-political context - did change at the global level result to fundamental changes in women's lives at the local level?
